NO KIDDING Just because Pixar isn't putting out a film this year doesn't mean that director-producer John Lasseter and his East Bay elves have been slacking off. They're entitled to a hiatus after the success of Monsters, Inc. shushed cynics

who suggested Pixar was nothing more than the house that Toy Story built. BUGS BUNNY IS SO LAST CENTURY The animation aces are hard at work on Finding Nemo, an undersea adventure featuring Pixar's trademark blend of wit, warmth, and anarchic action. And Lasseter recently took charge of casting and dubbing for the English-language version of anime master Hayao Miyazaki's stunning, full-length Spirited Away. NHO The city's busiest author-auteur. AGE 35. HOME The Mission. THE TOAST OF HOLLYWOOD With Being Vincent, his first short film, in the can, courtesy of Fox Searchlight's lab for new directors, Noah Hawley is officially a hyphenate. While the newly christened writer-director mulls feature-film ideas, he monitors what's going on with his various screenplays. YOU KNOW THAT CLICHE ABOUT JUGGLING PROJECTS! Former San Francisco performance artist and theater director Charles Herman-Wurmfeld (who moved to L.A. and directed the indie film hit Kissing Jessica Stein) is preparing to shoot Hawley's action-comedy script The Yes Man; meanwhile, The Alibi is set up with the company that produced Chris Nolan's Memento. Oh, and remember A Conspiracy of Tall Men, the taut first novel that got Hawley noticed in the first place? He's writing the screenplay for Paramount. PAY ATTENTION in January, when Being Vincent could debut at the Sundance Film Festival.

EHREN KRUGER

WHO Shocking screenwriter. AGE 29. HOME Cole Valley. WRITING SCARED Highbrow films have their place, but we have a definite soft spot for the crafty thrillers that aren't, alas, allowed anywhere near the spotlight on Oscar night. So does Ehren Kruger, who declares, "I would be more than happy to be considered a writer of quality B movies." HOT CHILLS Kruger's ultraparanoid Arlington Road, with Jeff Bridges and Tim Robbins, creeped us out good in 1999, and his latest shocker, The Ring, which stars Brian Cox and Mulholland Drive's Naomi Watts, is a remake of a recent Japanese chiller that gave nightmares to thousands. Who said horror films can't be smart as well as scary? PAY ATTENTION in October, when The Ring opens.

WHO Documentary daredevil. AGE 30. HOME Potrero Hill. NO GUTS, NO GLORY In Double Dare (its tentative title), Amanda Micheli trains her camera on stuntwomen at opposite ends of their careers. Legendary pioneer Jeannie Epper has paved the road over four decades, while Zoe Bell recently jumped from Xena: Warrior Princess to Quentin Tarantino's Kill Bill to do the acrobatics for Uma Thurman, HER HEROES HAVE ALWAYS BEEN cowgires Micheli's Harvard thesis film, a portrait of female rodeo riders, aired on PBS in 1996. "What I really admired," says S.F. filmmaker Jay Rosenblatt, "was her courage in embracing her subject. She not only put herself in the film, she put herself on the horse." PAY ATTENTION in January, when Double Dare may get a berth at Sundance.
